## Our Projects

### 1. Micro Enterprises & Livelihood Project

- Sanitary Napkin Unit -AK Nagar

#### Vocational Training - Self-help Women Groups (SHGs)

- 6 SHG Groups with 61 women in AK Nagar
- 7 SHG Groups with 73 women in Gavinivaripalem

Self-help groups are formed with 134 women members in two villages gather every month group wise for a monthly meeting to address and solve common problems through mutual support, promote financial inclusion among the poor, empower women, encourage income generating activities and livelihood development, foster community participation and social cohesion and to enable access to credit without dependence on money lenders, awareness on health, education, rights and access to government schemes and entitlements.

Children of SHG women pursuing professional courses are being provided with educational support. Some women are supported with seeds to grow vegetables to promote kitchen gardening and they stopped buying instead cooking the vegetables grown in their kitchen garden. 19 women got accessed to 'Srinidhi' Andhra Pradesh State government scheme and were benefited with livestock.

Capacity buildings are organized bi-monthly to build the capacity of SHG women with the support of external resource persons in the areas of income generation, health and hygiene. Irregular attendance, resistance from male family members and delay in bank linkages are the challenges which are being addressed constantly.

However, GPF's SHG initiative supported by Operation Blessing has shown positive changes in the lives of rural women folk. With sustained support and capacity building, SHGs can become strong institutions for poverty alleviation and women's empowerment.

## Story-1

### Empowering Women through Entrepreneurship:

The Journey of **Mrs. Sunanda and Mrs. Sakuntala** – Rajiv Group, Gavinivaripalem.

This is the inspiring story of two women — Mrs. Sunanda and Mrs. Sakuntala, members of the Rajiv Self-Help Group (SHG) in Gavinivaripalem. These both women are regular in attendance in the monthly meetings being held every month. They both got motivated in SHG monthly meetings and capacity building programs conducted by GPF, and they started making edibles and selling. It was a surprise for them the total edibles they make are getting sold off earning double the income covering their investment to support their families. They took their first steps into entrepreneurship by starting a small-scale sweets and snacks business. Their journey reflects the power of capacity-building programs in transforming lives and fostering economic independence among women. They are able to earn double the expenditure by the sale of the edibles.



## Success Stories

### Story-2

#### **Learnt to Save – Duddu Ribka - Bethel Group AK Nagar.**

I, **Duddu Ribka** of Bethel Group, AK Nagar have been regularly attending SHG meetings every month, where we gained valuable awareness on topics such as savings, income generation, health, and personal development. Earlier, whatever we earned from daily labor was spent entirely, but now, we have learnt started setting aside some amount. Last month, we were taught about kitchen gardening and given vegetable seeds. Before this, I never knew how the vegetables we eat were grown or sold that they often contain harmful chemicals. Through these meetings, I learnt to cultivate my own kitchen garden at home with the support of seeds given by GPF, growing chemical-free vegetables that are safe for our health. Now, I harvest fresh vegetables for cooking, saving around ₹300 per week. Earlier, I used to spend about ₹2,000 a month on vegetables, but with this initiative, I am now able to save ₹1,000 every month. I realize that I would have never gained this knowledge and these benefits if I had stayed at home without attending the SHG meetings.

## Sanitary Napkin Unit (SNU)

The production of sanitary napkins by selected Self-help group (SHG) women is a significant step towards women's empowerment, health and livelihood supported by our Donor – Operation Blessing. This initiative not only provides a source of income to women from the marginalized communities but also addresses the critical issue of menstrual hygiene among rural and underserved populations with a quality at affordable prices.

To ensure the safety and effectiveness of the sanitary napkins, the production is carried out under strict hygienic conditions including sanitized rooms free from dust and pests; women are provided with gloves, masks and hairnets. All the tools used in the production process are regularly cleaned and maintained. High quality of raw materials such as absorbent cotton, non-woven fabric and biodegradable wrapping are used. Finished napkins are sealed in clean, moisture-proof packaging and stored in a dry and dust free environment.

SHG women were provided with full pledged training in all processes of making, marketing and book keeping. The impact is increased hygiene awareness and access in rural areas and contribution to environmental sustainability through biodegradable product and promotion of women led micro enterprises. The women made 1801 napkins and sold 976 packets till March 2025.





### **3. WASH (Water, Sanitation & Hygiene Hand Pump Well Project**

Access to Safe and clean drinking water remains a significant challenge in many rural areas. Communities often rely on unsafe sources such as ponds, rivers or open wells which expose them to water borne diseases. During dry seasons, existing sources may dry up or become polluted. Women or children walk long distances to fetch water, consuming time and energy that could be used for education or income generating activities. The lack of basic services result in waterborne diseases, high child mortality, school absenteeism and poor health outcomes.

To provide sustainable and safe drinking water to rural communities through the installation of hand pump wells were dug to an appropriate depth to access ground water. Baseline survey was done to identify the

areas with the support of local panchayats and community leaders and depth of wells based on hydro geological tests, use of high-quality corrosion resistant materials and community participation. Village Water Committees with a priority to women were formed and provided them with capacity building and trainings on hand pump well maintenance, health and hygiene and complete in-charge of maintenance of hand pump wells.

The system and process followed for hand pump wells is

- On line water testing
- Hydro geological test
- Drilling
- Shock chlorination
- Flushing water after 48 hours of shock chlorination
- Water is collected during flushing activity and then sent for water lab testing based on 20 parameters specified by WHO
- Platform construction based on water lab test positive results
- Hand pump installation
- Dedication
- 3 WASH Trainings - Village Water Committee (VWC) is formed with 3 women and 2 men and trained in general maintenance of the hand pump along with health and hygiene, hand wash and open defecation. In turn, VWCs have to train the whole community.

**Total no. of Bore wells as a Pilot project: 9 (3 with Hand pumps & 6 without Hand pumps). 260 families are the beneficiaries through only 3 bore wells.**
